

Pros and cons of common document storage solutions

Before you can store electronic copies of your documents, you will need to decide where you are going to store them.

When you're in an emergency, you want to make things as smooth as possible. That's why you should select a storage solution that allows you to access and share your important documents in the easiest way for you, so you can concentrate on getting back on track.

There are a number of ways you can store your documents electronically. The best choice for you will depend on your own circumstances and needs. You may also consider using a combination of these solutions, to ensure you can access your important documents with or without an internet connection or working device.

Here is an overview of the most common document storage solutions:



Using your device

(Your phone, computer, or tablet)

Storing files on your device means saving your important documents into the internal storage of your phone, computer, or tablet.



✓ PROS:

- You can access your files on your device at anytime, even without the internet.

✗ CONS:

- If your device is lost or broken, you will not be able to access your files.
- Devices may be infected with a virus, which may make your files unusable.

Using a USB

A USB (Universal Serial Bus) is a portable drive that you can store files on. If you plug it into a computer, you will be able to access your documents on the device you are using, where you can then copy them to the device, or email them to someone you trust.



✓ PROS:

- USBs are highly portable, so you can carry them with you easily.
- You don't need the internet to access them, just a working computer.
- For some people this will feel a safer option as you will hold your information physically, and it won't be in stored in an online environment.

✗ CONS:

- USBs are typically the size of a thumb, meaning they may get lost or broken in an emergency if not kept close.
- A USB may have limited storage capacity which may make storing larger files difficult.
- You will not be able to access the files on your phone.
- The files may become 'corrupted' if it is plugged into a computer with a virus, which may make them unusable.

Using the 'cloud'

The 'cloud' is storage that can be accessed through the internet. You can see, download, and share your documents with any device that has an internet connection. There are many different cloud providers, that are usually free for small amounts of data.



✓ PROS:

- You can access your files from any computer or phone with an internet connection.
- You can share your documents with other people you trust, so they can access the files too.
- You can store larger amounts of data than some of the other options listed.

✗ CONS:

- If you don't have internet connection, you will not be able to access them.
- You will need to remember your username and password to access them, and potentially use your phone to help you log in if you have additional security settings enabled.
- The files may be at risk of a cyber attack.

Using emails

Your emails can store your files if you email them as attachments to yourself. This will mean your files will be in the email program you use, for example, Gmail, Yahoo, or Outlook.



✓ PROS:

- You can access your documents on your phone or computer so long as you can access the internet.
- Only you can access the documents, and anyone who has access to your emails.
- You can forward them onto important people easily, such as friends, family, or lawyers.

✗ CONS:

- It may be difficult to find your specific documents amongst your other emails.
- Email inboxes have storage limits.
- You will need to remember your username and password to access them.
- It is possible for email servers to be hacked.

Remember, you may want to consider using a combination of these storage solutions so that you can access copies of your important documents whenever and wherever you need them.
